# Global Partnership Monitoring

- **Provides evidence on progress, opportunities, obstacles in the implementation of Effective Development Cooperation commitments to:**
  - Support mutual accountability
  - Stimulate and inform multi-stakeholder dialogue nationally, regionally and globally on how to make development cooperation more effective
- **Addis Ababa Action Agenda**
  - Effective development cooperation is crucial to achieving SDGs

# Global Partnership Monitoring

- **Ten indicators on Effective Development Cooperation Principles:**
  - Ownership by developing countries
  - Focus on results
  - Partnerships for inclusive development
  - Transparency and accountability

## Indicator Two:

- Civil society operates within an environment that maximizes its engagement in and contribution to development



### **Module 1. Space for Multi-stakeholder Dialogue.**

This module speaks to the importance of space for CSOs to engage in multi-stakeholder dialogue at national, regional and global levels.

### **Module 2. CSO Development Effectiveness,**

**Accountability and Transparency.** This module speaks to actions that can be undertaken by CSOs themselves to enhance their effectiveness, accountability and transparency.

## Indicator Two four-module framework

### **Module 3. Official Development Cooperation**

**with CSOs.** This module addresses how development cooperation providers' engagement with CSOs can be optimized in line with effective development cooperation principles.

### **Module 4. Legal and Regulatory Environment.**

This module addresses what governments can do through appropriate legal and regulatory frameworks to create an environment that is conducive for CSOs.

# Indicator Two Multi-stakeholder Monitoring Process

- Government leads process through National Coordinators
- Multi-stakeholder dialogue for data gathering and validation
- Coordination of stakeholder engagement and inputs via CSO and Donor Focal Points

*"This indicator is primarily built to provide a useful tool to spark multi-stakeholder dialogue at the country level among governments, CSOs and providers, to identify progress as well as room for improvement in CSO enabling environment and CSO development effectiveness." - (GP Monitoring Guide, p. 26)*

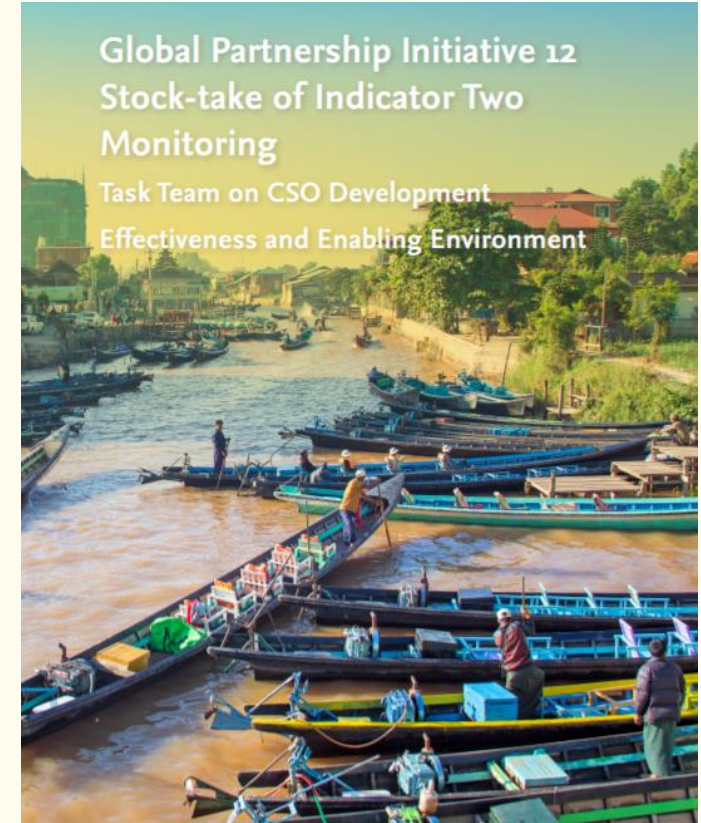


# Task Team Stock-take of Indicator Two Monitoring Experience 2016

- Multi-stakeholder dialogue process not fully applied
- Donors insufficiently involved, CSO engagement not sufficiently inclusive, dialogues not always taking place

**YET....**

- Keen interest in ongoing/institutionalizing multi-stakeholder dialogue as opportunity to build bridges across stakeholder groups, mutual understanding and respect



# Global Partnership 2018 Monitoring

- Monitoring every two years – next round 2018
- Launch & outreach for country participation Q1 2018
- Monitoring roll out May 2018, data submission Q3 2018
- Report Q1 2019
